A few thoughts for simple reflection on this first Sunday of Lent



The Spirit drove Jesus into the wilderness and why?

If you go therefore to the desert to be rid of all the dreadful people and all the awful problems in your life, you will be wasting your time. You should go to the desert to see more and see better. One goes to the desert especially to take a closer look at the things and people one would rather not see, to face situations one would rather avoid, to answer questions one would rather forget. – From 'Mediations on the Sand' by **Alessandro Pronzato**



In this desert of solitary prayer, Jesus is tempted. If we look more closely at these temptations, we see that the devil seized on the moment between what Jesus knew about himself and what he was experiencing. Jesus knew he was the Son of God. But if you are, says the devil, you should not be hungry, you should not be powerless, you should not be alone. And what does Jesus do? He places his divine nature to one side and takes his place on the side of the poor, the abandoned, the weak, "worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone." ... therefore Jesus goes into the desert, therefore he fasts; therefore he leaves behind everything else that a person needs even for bare existence, so that for this once not just in the depths of his heart but in the whole range of his being he can do and say what is the first and last duty of humankind – to find God, to seek God, to belong to God to the exclusion of everything else that makes up human life. – **Karl Rahner**

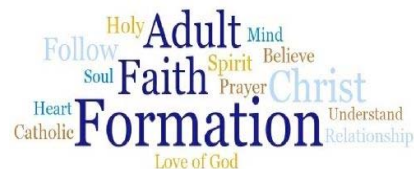

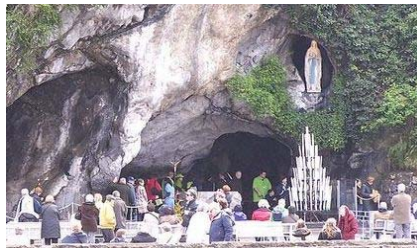

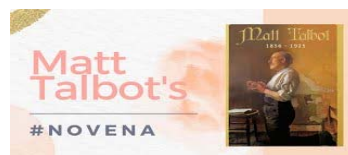
Sponsor a Sick Person

Sr. Regina Lewis

Sr. Regina Lewis entered the Poor Clare Community, in Ennis in 1961. She was a native of Co. Clare and enjoyed everything Irish!

An invitation from Australian Poor Clares to make a joint Foundation to Papua New Guinea found Sr. Regina among the small band of four Irish sisters joining four Australian sisters embarking on a new Foundation to Papua New Guinea in 1971.

The sisters have been in New Guinea for the last 55 years and the community have expanded to 8 indigenous sisters and now one remaining Australian sister.

Less than two years ago Regina returned to Ireland on sick leave, but still her desire was to return to PNG and to the many people who shared her life, supporting her in her fruitful, missionary and contemplative vocation.

The Lord had other plans for her. She experienced ill health and eventually was confined to a wheelchair. All within a week spent in hospital, she met Her Great Love on Valentine's Day! Wasn't Regina a person of coincidence?!

She had a lively and engaging personality and gracefully accepted all that lay ahead of her in her final illness. We know for many days we will talk of her escapades, adventures, and endless stories, of which there are many.

Regina passed away in the early hours of the morning of 14th February 2026. Her Funeral Mass was celebrated on Monday among her family, friends, brother friars, Bishop Fintan Monahan and a large number of clergy.

We know that Regina went calmly and peacefully, "for she had a *good escort* for her journey – *the King of Glory*". St. Clare

Gn 2:7-9; 3:1-7

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden, which is in the east; and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, "Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?"

The woman answered the serpent, "We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden.
