4th August 2024 Year B


'I am the bread of life. The one who comes to me will never be hungry; The one who believes in me will never thirst'.

Walking into a Bakery with the scent of the breads and confectionary on display is one of life's pleasures. The selection of breads is a reflection of the privileged time we live in. Gone are the days that for most families a loaf of bread was a home produced product. That has changed for so many households as we now can head to the shop and decide what bread we would like today. Yes, choice is everywhere.

Our readings today offer us choices. Elisha in the Book of Kings makes a choice to share bread with the one hundred people gathered before him. St. Paul in the Letter to the Ephesians calls out for unity and to share whatever resources at our disposal. Psalm 144 has the words 'You gave them their food in due time'. And our Gospel leads us to the core of the message this weekend. The Good News does not remain at the level of a pleasant scent of feeling good but a call to go deeper and share the resources common to all humanity. Uncomfortable as it reads but today's readings can be summed up in one word – compassion.

Elisha felt compassion for the hungry and fed them bread. St. Paul called on the Ephesians to unite in their effort to share with each other and Psalm 144 sings for joy because the hungry were fed. Our Gospel guides us to a realisation the motivation underpinning that true compassion is that Jesus Christ is our foundation upon which all our actions stem from. As we celebrate Eucharist this weekend, gathered like the people in Elisha's time, united as St. Paul asked the Ephesians to live, we sing out the words of the Psalm thanking God for what we have and sharing the Word as Jesus is:

The Bread of Life.



Three Cardinals, five Apostolic Nuncios, Bishops and Priests from both here in Ireland and all around the world gathered in the Cathedral at 11am when both the local and universal Church prayed together.

It was a day of joy for all the faithful, lay and clerical who took part in the Ordination Ceremony.

An tAifreann

Is cuid lárnach inár gcreidimh agus inár saol an tAifreann. Tá sé de dhualgas orainn freastal ar an Aifreann gach Domhnach.

Ag Séire an Tiarna an oíche sula bhfuair Sé bás, thug Íosa a Chorp Féin do na deisceabail agus dúinne ag rá 'tógaigí, ithigí agus ólaigí iad seo, Mo Chorp agus m'Fhuil". (Matha 26:28).Ba é seo an chéad Aifreann. Ó shin i leith tá sé de phribhléid againn freastal ar an Aifreann agus Comaoin Naofa a ghlacadh. Léirigh muintir na hÉireann ómós agus grá don Aifreann i gcónaí fiú le linn na bPéin Dlíthe (1695-1746) nuair a bhí cosc ar dhaoine freastal ar an Aifreann. Thaistil siad go háiteanna iarqúlta anseo is ansiúd chun freastal ar an Aifreann cé gur minic a bhí siad i mbaol. Mar fhianaise ar sin is mó Carraig an Aifrinn atá le feiceáil ar fud na tíre. D'fhág Íosa an tAifreann againn lena chuimhne a choimeád beo agus buan dúinn.

Is maith liom an phaidir ghearr seo: *A Shacraimint rónaofa*,

a Shacraimint ródhiaga, gach moladh agus buíochas go raibh agat choíche. Áiméan.

The Mass is central in our faith and in our lives. We are obliged to attend Mass each Sunday. At the Last Supper on the night before He died Jesus gave Himself to the Apostles and to us when He said "take this eat and drink, this is my body, this is my blood." This was the first Mass. We have the privilege of receiving Holy Communion each time we attend Mass. Our ancestors had great respect for and love of the Mass. During the Penal Laws (1695-1746) when they were forbidden to attend Mass they travelled to lonely place and put their lives in danger to attend Mass. We have evidence of this as there are Mass Rocks in many places in Ireland. Jesus left us the Mass in remembrance of Him. I like this short prayer:

A Shacraimint rónaofa, a Shacraimint ródhiaga, gach moladh agus buíochas go raibh agat choíche. Áiméan.

As it is, you have brought us to this wilderness to starve this whole company to death'! Then the Lord said to Moses, Now I will rain down bread for you from the heavens. Each day the people are to go out and gather the days portion; I propose to test them in this way to see whether they will follow my law or not.' 'I have heard the complaints of the sons of Israel. Say this to them, "Between the two evenings you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have bread to your hearts content. Then you will learn that I, the Lord, am your God.' And so it came about: quails flew up in the evening, and they covered the camp; in the morning there was a coating of dew all round the camp. When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground.
