Wouldn't you love to know what Jesus wrote with his finger in the sand. While those who brought the woman to Jesus were pointing their fingers at her, Jesus uses his pointing finger, not to point and accuse, but to write in the sand.

Interestingly what Jesus initially wrote seems to have made no impression on the accusatory mob. Might the first message that Jesus wrote in the sand have been for the woman? Might it have been this message, written in the sand, that enabled her to hold her ground and to begin to stand tall?

Then Jesus invites her accusers to reflect on themselves and if they have never sinned, by all means be the first to throw a stone. But then we are told that Jesus returns to writing in the sand again. Whatever he wrote this time seems to have had an effect because the accusers walked away one by one, beginning with the eldest. There is nothing as powerful as self-reflection that leads to self-realisation.

And the story finishes with Jesus looking up to the woman who has up to now been looked down on by these finger pointing men. Jesus has not only freed her from these men who were using her to get at him, he has gifted her the new perspective of being looked up to in life. In doing so Jesus gifted her the freedom found in forgiveness. He gifted her the possibility of a future filled with possibility and hope. He gifted her the liberating invitation to live and truly love again.

May we see where Jesus has written this lifegiving message of love in the sands of our lives and our hearts this Lent.

Sr. Attracta Duggan 21st June 1935—25th March 2025



Sr. Attracta Duggan died peacefully at St. Xavier's Convent, Ennis on Tuesday 25th March 2025 on the Feast of the Annunciation; after a short illness.

Known as Maura, Mary Christina, the youngest of ten children, was born to Kate Kearney and James Duggan on 21st of June 1935 in Caherkine, Newmarket-on-Fergus. Her primary education was at Quin National School and secondary at Colaiste Muire, Ennis. Her five brothers and four sisters have all pre-deceased her.

Maura joined the Sisters of Mercy St. Xavier's Convent, Ennis, on Mercy Day, 24th of September 1953. Her chosen motto was: "Thy will be done". Sr. Attracta, completed a B.A. at University College, Cork, followed by the Higher Diploma in Education at University College, Galway. Attracta had an uninterrupted teaching career - in Colaiste Muire, Spanish Point and Killaloe. People who were her teaching colleagues or past pupils always add, when they enquire about her current welfare, 'she was one great teacher'! All who knew her agree with that assessment. Attracta was a dedicated, committed, hardworking teacher who had an obvious love for her subject, the Irish language. For many years, she spent at least a month of her Summer holidays teaching Irish i gColáiste Laichtin Naofa, Inis Thoir.

Attracta's devotion to the Irish language was symbolic of her deep love of Irish culture in its totality: history, song, dance, customs, traditions as well as language. In her years in Spanish Point, she never missed the annual Fleadh Cheoil in Ennis and particularly loved the final event of the week which was the Saturday night concert - she regarded it as the highlight. Her interest also extended to the GAA- especially Clare hurling!

Coming from a large family, Attracta has many nieces and nephews who kept regular contact. In her younger days, she had a special concern for people who were sick, and was a regular visitor especially to those who were to be hospitalized.

In the words of Venerable Catherine McAuley, foundress of the Sisters of Mercy "let us take care of the present. God will take care of the future. The best preparation for death is a life well spent". Sr. Attracta lived that type of life. She lived it well and in the present.

Her Funeral took place in the Cathedral on Friday 28th March with burial in the Mercy Plot of Drumcliffe Cemetery.

Walking in Faith

During Lent we reflect each week on individuals who walk in faith and can inspire us on our journey. This week Venerable Matt Talbot.

2nd May 1856—7th June 1925

On 19th September 1853 Charles Talbot married Elizabeth Bagnell in Clontarf, Dublin.

Both came from a working class background where poverty and excessive use of alcohol were prevalent. These were the years after the great famine where



people struggled to survive. Charles & Elizabeth were parents to 12 children, 9 of whom survived beyond infancy. Their second child Matthew was born on 2nd May 1856. Matt's parents were good people who handed on a solid faith to their children. While poor in the eyes of the world they were rich in their love of God. Charlie was a good worker, his only weakness was that he drank too much. The family lived in 18 different addresses over a 41 year period. Through all their difficulties the family prayed the Rosary together each day.

Matt like so many others did not avail of the opportunity for education offered by the new emerging Religious Orders. He was eleven years old when he did a crash course in Religious Knowledge. Lacking education he frequently stole and was rough spoken and drank heavily. He began working at the age of 12 and by the age of 17 he was a chronic alcoholic and this continued until he was 28. in 1884 he found himself unemployed and lacking money for drink. He made the decision to become a pioneer and abstain from alcohol. It wasn't easy for him but he turned to Prayer, Mass and Holy Communion to give him the strength to keep his promise and was able to turn his life around. On Sunday 7th June 1925 he died suddenly on his way to Mass. In 1931 the Archbishop of Dublin began the process of investigating his life. On 7th June this year Matt will be 100 years dead and devotion to him continues to grow as people seek his Intercession with them own struggles and addictions.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Philippians Phil 3:8-14

I believe nothing can happen that will outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For him I have accepted the loss of everything, and I look on everything as so much rubbish if only I can have Christ and be given a place in him. I am no longer trying for perfection by my own efforts, the perfection that comes from the Law, but I want only the perfection that comes through faith in Christ, and is from God and based on faith.
