

Live the Word:

Let us never forget: we cannot stand by as onlookers when we see so many people worn out by hunger, violence and injustice. In the parable, the Levite and the priest walk

by the man who had been attacked by thieves and lay half dead on the side of the road. To ignore people's suffering means to ignore God. Compassion is an essential characteristic of God's mercy. It is the same compassion with which God encounters each of us. This teaches us that compassion and love are not vague sentiments; but mean caring for the other to the point of personal sacrifice.

The Somme Remembered

- The Battle of the Somme is synonymous with remembrance of the First World War and the futility of trench warfare. Fighting at the Battle of the Somme began on 1st July 1916 and lasted four and a half months.
- In total, 60 nations from across the British Commonwealth and Europe were involved in the fighting across a 25 kilometer front.
- There were almost 60,000 Allied casualties on the first day of the battle. Of these 2000 were from Ireland (mainly men of the 36th Ulster Division, the only unit to secure its objective that day, and the Irish of Tyneside and Liverpool).
- 460 men from the now Republic of Ireland died on July 1st 1916.
- The German losses were estimated to be 8,000.
- Later in the battle between September 1st-9th, similar losses would be suffered by the men of the 16th (Irish) Division during their successful liberation of the Somme villages of Guillemont and Ginchy. Among the Irish dead were the poet and Nationalist M.P. Tom Kettle.
- At the start of the battle, most of the British Army had been an inexperienced mass of volunteers. Going over the top at the Somme was the first taste of battle for many men, as a large number were part of "Kitchener's Volunteer Army" which was formed by "Pals battalions".
- The Pals battalions were made up of groups of friends, team mates in sports clubs and colleagues, who had joined together expecting to fight alongside each other. The heavy losses in one battalion had a profound effect on Britain and Ireland and were felt locally and nationally.
- Of the approaching half a million British and Imperial injuries suffered in the 141-day battle, a third resulted in death. When the offensive finally came to a halt on 18th November 1916, the Battle of the Somme had claimed a million casualties; 430,000 from Commonwealth countries.

If you read the newsletter any Sunday you will see pilgrimages advertised to various places in Ireland and abroad. A pilgrimage is a visit to a holy place to spend some time in prayer and meditation. The first pilgrimages were made to the Holy Land and to places connected to the ministry of Christ. Pilgrimages are an ancient custom in Ireland dating back to the fifth and sixth centuries. Each Summer thousands visit Lough Derg or Knock or Croagh Patrick, Ireland's holiest mountain looking out on Cuan Modh. It is one of the highest peaks in the West, seven hundred meters above sea level. According to tradition people have climbed the mountain since the Stone Age to the present day without a break. Pagans climbed it to celebrate the Harvest. St Patrick spent forty days there fasting and praying in 441A.D. His bell was there for many years. His statue was erected there in 1928 and this is the first station for the pilgrim. The last Sunday in July is the traditional day of pilgrimage. Mass is celebrated in the church at the summit. You can say this prayer before you go on pilgrimage.

Lord, make us prophets of our times, pilgrims not wayfarers. May each day begin with prayerful preparation, opening our hearts to a spirit of loving repentance. Amen
