Temptations: a twofold struggle towards freedom

In the Gospel passage today we read the account of the Temptations of Jesus. This is the usual passage chosen for the first Sunday of Lent and sets the theme for the forthcoming season. These temptations, to turn stones to bread, to put the Lord to the test and to worship Satan himself in return for temporal power and glory are deeply theological both in content and meaning. For example, the striking parallel between the faithfulness of Jesus during his


40 day trial as opposed to the grumbling of the Israelites during their 40 years wandering in the desert highlights how in Jesus there is something new and wonderful happening; a new creation is imminent!

However, I often wonder how does this reading truly speak to us? Perhaps it can only speak to us when we begin to internalise the content. This is so because in life, every day, we are exposed to temptation too. These

temptations may be so subtle that we may not even realise they are present in our lives. These are the temptations which creep almost unnoticed into our lives.

All too often we hear about the temptations in this day and age that would sway us towards power and greed, modern day temptations of ignorance, cowardice or irresponsibility are cruel and need to be avoided. However, there are other temptations which may be even more deadly. These are temptations to despair, to dreadful feelings of inadequacy, to self-pity, to self-hatred and loathing. These are the temptations that we struggle with in our lives in this day and age, internally and externally.

A few weeks ago Jesus told us that we are the "Light of the World" and therefore in the face of these temptations that we endure it is worth remembering that as it is on the inside so shall it be on the outside. In other words your outside world is reflecting back to you exactly as you are on the inside.



Your outside world corresponds with the thoughts, beliefs, and feelings you hold on the inside. Your friends, your job, your situation is all a reflection of who you are or what has happened to you on the inside. There is something well worth remembering though... You were made by God, and nobody else is like you in the whole world nor could anyone else do

the great job of being you that you do! God does not labour in vain & therefore you have a purpose and do not be afraid to discover it.

When we remember these things we will see our true value in the eyes of God who loves us as we are, warts and all. It is at this point that the temptations give way to the truth of freedom, the truth that tells us in the words of Brittany Josephina "The most important day is the day you decide you are good enough for you. It is the day you set yourself free."

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden, which is in the east; and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.
